

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The 2023 Annual Report highlights West Visayas State University's commitment to academic excellence, research innovation, and community engagement, outlining key achievements, financial performance, strategic initiatives, and hospital services performance:

Academic Excellence

- Enrollment Growth: Total **student enrollment increased by 4.5**%, reaching above 20,000 students across undergraduate and graduate programs.
- Licensure Performance: The University achieved an **overall passing percentage of 80.49%** for first-time licensure exam takers, which increased by **9.97%** from 2022.

Research and Extension

- Externally-Funded Research: Secured **5 research grants** from various institutions.
- Research Publications: The University **published 53 papers in peer-reviewed journals** compared to **22 the previous year**.
- Completed Research: The University completed 99 research outputs compared to 78 the previous year.

Community Engagement

- Training Programs: Expanded our extension initiatives, training **over 11,000 individuals** through educational workshops and livelihood programs.
- Extension Linkages: **51 new and active linkages** with various institutions and organizations through our extension activities, **fewer than the previous year's** accomplishment of **56 linkages**.

Financial Performance

- National Budget: The total national subsidy of the University increased by 47.59%, wherein 36.49% was obligated and 64.05% was disbursed.
- Income Generation: The University surpassed its target for **gross profit by 16.61% and the net income by 34.06%**.

Hospital Services Performance

- Hospital Infection Rate: The UMC achieved a 1.26% Hospital Infection Rate or the percentage of patients discharged (including deaths) that contracted hospital acquired infections
- Client Satisfaction: The University Medical Center achieved an **average rating of 97.16**% among all of its services.

The combined online and traditional delivery of library services has broadened the library's reach during the pandemic, contributing to a significant increase in the number of clients served.






Number of Journals/Serials Publications Received




Instructional Effectiveness Program Intensified

The WVSU has demonstrated remarkable success in the licensure examinations, achieving an impressive passing rate of 80.49%. Out of **2,163 first-time takers**, **1,741 students successfully passed their respective licensure examinations** -- a result of the University's strong academic programs and effective preparation strategies. On top of this achievement the University was able to produce a total of **16 topnotchers in 2023**.


Overall Performance (In all Licensure Exams taken by all Campuses)




Licensure Exam for Teachers (Elementary Level) Licensure Exam for Teachers (Secondary Level)







Continuous Enhancement of Academic Programs

The Strategic Development Plan for 2023 targeted a 70% Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) of all its curricular programs.

For this year, **75 out of 93 programs** of the University received their COPC or 80.65% compliance rate for the WVSU system. This achievement reflects the dedicated efforts toward quality assurance and program effectiveness. Additionally, there are still **18 programs under evaluation** by the Regional Quality Assessment Team (RQAT) and the National Quality Assessment Team (NQAT). These evaluations will determine if these remaining programs will also meet the compliance standards, potentially increasing the overall program compliance rate.

The cumulative efforts of the CAF faculty members have produced outstanding results in cultivating the minds of the next generation of agriculturists and foresters. Through their dedication and innovative teaching methods, they have successfully imparted essential knowledge and skills to students, preparing them to tackle the complex challenges of modern agriculture and forestry. The faculty's commitment to fostering a supportive and dynamic learning environment has not only enhanced academic excellence but also inspired a passion for sustainable practices among students. As a result, graduates are well-equipped to contribute to the advancement of their fields, ensuring a healthier and more sustainable future for our planet.

This year, the passing percentage of first-time licensure exam takers for Forestry reached an all time high of **83.72**% surpassing other renowned institutions throughout the country. **Rico Silvestre placed 7th in the licensure examinations with a rating of 90.15**%.

The Licensure Exam for Agriculturists likewise achieved a **47.22%** passing rate for first-time licensure exam takers, relatively higher than the 34.18% national passing rate.



WVSU-CAF ensures the quality of its academic programs by ensuring that college's curricular offerings are compliant with the standards set by the Commission on Higher Education. In FY 2023, all of its undergraduate and graduate school programs have received their Certificates of Program Compliance, issued by CHED, except for Ph.D. in Agriculture which is still awaiting the result of the evaluation.





College of Arts and Sciences

The **College of Arts and Sciences** (CAS) stands as a hub for academic excellence and critical thinking, offering a diverse range of degree programs that cater to the intellectual and professional growth of its students. 
Continued Excellence Through Student Exposure and Research




While instructional materials were enhanced by CAS faculty, there is a decline in new IMs. Orientation programs are conducted by the college and student organizations for each program. Two college-wide capability-building activities have been conducted.





Programs undergo regular local review by each department. Most programs are accredited by AACCUP. All undergraduate programs received their Certificate of Program Compliance from CHED, while most graduate programs await COPCs after visits from the National Quality Assessment Team.





The college has sufficient funds to send faculty members to seminars, workshops, and trainings related to Instruction, Research, and Extension. This can also be augmented by faculty research and extension efforts.

College of Business and Management

The success and effectiveness of any educational institution are intricately tied to its ability to continually assess and enhance its performance. In this narrative report, we delve into a comprehensive performance review of the College of Business and Management, a vital component of our academic community.





The college, together with the International and Local Linkages Office (ILLO) and College of Information and Communications Technology (CICT) , has hosted the two-week academic stay of Indonesian students for the inbound exchange program. Business Administration students assisted them in their academic and cultural activities throughout their stay here in Iloilo.



Two (2) Bachelor of Science in Tourism Management students qualified and participated in the UMAP Discovery Camp Winter 2023 in Indonesia from February 5–17, 2023. They gained insights about Indonesia through exploration of Surabaya and Semarang. These tourism students gained insights and experiences related to technology development in society, city development, culture, art, food, and social interaction, all of which are aligned with tourism.

A major achievement for the college was being chosen by the Cooperative Development Authority as one of the official trainers for their accredited training providers in the entire Visayas area. A memorandum of agreement was signed in order to formalize this recognition.





Another important highlight for the college is that four (4) faculty members participated in a study visit to the **University of Aveiro** for the development of the **Master of Science in Family Business Management,** an ERASMUS Capacity Building in Higher Education (CBHE) project. The participants visited three companies, Viarco-Indústria de Lápis, Lda., Bulhosas, and Belcinto, for the Formative Assessment Benchmarking (FAB) Project. The visits provided first-hand experience to the faculty who will be teaching the MsFAB.





In 2023, tourism students had their first experience as tour operator with an external client-Philippine Council of Mathematics Board of Directors and members. Handling their first tour as operators was a transformative experience for the students, offering a blend of practical skill development, interpersonal growth, and exposure to the multifaceted nature of the tourism industry. This hands-on experience lays the foundation for a successful and rewarding career in tourism.

College of Information and Communications Technology

The College of Information and Communications Technology (CICT) excels through a combination of strengths and best practices that underscore its commitment to academic excellence. The faculty's impressive research profiles significantly enhance both faculty and student research productivity, creating a vibrant academic environment. A dynamic student research and innovation program cultivates a culture of inquiry and creativity, while a technopreneurial mindset equips students with practical skills for real-world applications. Personalized guidance is a hallmark of the student-mentorship program, ensuring tailored support for individual growth. Furthermore, CICT's dedication to internationalization and robust industry partnerships cements its status as a leader in cutting-edge education and innovation, preparing students to excel in an ever-evolving technological landscape.

Student Research and Innovation Awards



The students of CICT at WVSU have embodied the spirit of excellence, creativity, and innovation by securing significant recognition for their research and innovation projects. This accomplishment underscores the College's dedication to academic excellence and positions them as leaders in innovative endeavors on a national level.

Notably, the **SafetyPin project**, developed by BS in Computer Science students Jeno Bellido, Ariane Marie Lavilla, and John Cairo Minerva under the guidance of Dr. Frank Elijorde, has been **honored as one of the top 10 finalists in the 2023 BPI-DOST Innovation Awards**. Their project, "SafetyPin: A Web Application for Recommending Safe Routes and Heatmap Visualization for Enhancing Citizen Safety Against Crimes," was presented at the Makati Diamond Residences in Legazpi Village, Makati, on December 11, 2023. This recognition not only highlights the students' innovative capabilities but also contributes significantly to the university's mission to become a research-centric institution.



Team AquaSense, comprised of 4th year BS in Information Technology students, namely Jayrose Bunda, Hannah Mae Arceño, and John Gabriel De Claro, with Dr. Regin Cabacas as adviser, **emerged as 2nd Runner Up** during the final round of **Philippine Startup Challenge Pitching Competition** held in Cebu City on December 6, 2023. They were also recognized as **Regional Champion and Best in Video Pitching** during the **Philippine Startup Challenge Pitching Competition** - Region VI on October 12, 2023.

Other noteworthy accomplishments from WVSU-CICT participants in the competition included **Team Innovex**, represented by the Exceipt Startup (BSCS 4-A), securing the **3rd Place**, and **Team Sparknovators** (BSCS 4-B) was awarded the **Best Startup Logo**. This remarkable achievement was the result of their exemplary performance, surpassing 56 entries and triumphing over 12 Regional Finalists hailing from various Higher Education Institutions (HEIs).











The first year **BSCS** students, namely, Kurt Allene R. Alloro, Lean Vince A. Cabales, Zuriel Eliazar D. Calix, Allyn Ralf T. Ledesma, and Ken Meiro C. Villareal, **clinched the championship at the inaugural Game Developers' Gauntlet** by Tech4All, held at SM City on November 12, 2023.



Bachelor of Library and Information Science (BLIS) students, namely Hannah P. Alayon and Crisol Ann S. Berganio, along with Dr. Manuela R. Losañes, Dr. Elra Di M. Madalogdog, Dr. Regin A. Cabacas, the CICT Dean, Dr. Ma. Beth S. Concepcion, and their adviser, Mr. Stephen B. Alayon, secured the prestigious **Best Paper award at** the 8th International Conference of Asian Special Libraries held on February 22-23, 2023. Their exceptional research not only stood out among contributions from various institutions but also underscored the depth of knowledge and commitment to scholarship within the BLIS program.

Four teams from the CICT were among the Oral Presentation Finalists during the DOST- WVCIEERD Research Conference.



Students' Licensure Performance



The pioneer batch of Bachelor of Library and Information Science (BLIS) students at West Visayas State University (WVSU) has achieved an impressive milestone by excelling in the **2023 Librarian Licensure Exam**. Demonstrating exceptional academic prowess, this inaugural group has secured a remarkable **91.67% passing rate**, significantly outperforming the national average of 62.64%, which saw 555 out of 886 examinees succeed. This stellar performance not only highlights the dedication and hard work of the students but also underscores the quality of education and training provided by WVSU. Their success sets a high standard for future cohorts and contributes positively to the professional landscape of library and information science in the region.

International Linkages



Engaging in a meaningful cross-cultural exchange, West Visayas State University, in particular the CICT, CBM and International and Local Linkages Office (ILLO), hosted exchange students from Institut Teknologi Sepuluh Nopember (ITS), Surabaya, East Java, Indonesia. The initiative, lasting from November 8 to 22, 2023, marked a significant milestone in WVSU's internationalization efforts.



Jayrose Bunda (4th year BSIT) was the university's delegate to the Community and Technological (CommTech) Camp, specifically the Sub Course on Internet of Things (IoT) for Society at Institut Teknologi Sepuluh Nopember (ITS) in Surabaya, Indonesia, from August 31 to September 1, 2023.

The vibrant tapestry of academic collaboration and cultural exchange unfolded during the International Students Day, where Visiting Professors, Dr. Julapot Chiravachradej and Dr. Chana Phutthananon, from King Mongkut's University of Technology Thonburi (KMUTT) played a pivotal role. Hosted and facilitated by the International and Local Linkages Office (ILLO), this event served as an opportunity for cross-cultural engagement and knowledge sharing, specifically of the College of ICT.





Prof. Yung Cheol-Byun, Director of Center of High Intelligence Service of Jeju National University, served as Visiting Professor from January 3 to February 24, 2023. Professor Yung Cheol-Byun significantly contributed to the university by bringing invaluable expertise and fostering collaborative initiatives.

Academe-and-Industry Partnerships



Successful Accreditation and Recognitions

The academic programs of the college have achieved success in accreditation and recognitions. The Bachelor of Science in Information Technology (BSIT) and Bachelor of Science in Information Systems (BSIS) have attained the Level 4 re-accreditation of AACCUP. Additionally, the Master of Information Technology (MIT) and Bachelor of Science in Computer Science (BSCS) have secured Level 2 accreditation, while the Bachelor of Science in Entertainment and Multimedia Computing (BSEMC) undergone the Preliminary Survey Visit (PSV), affirming our dedication to providing quality education across ITE disciplines. All the programs of the college are with Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC).

College of Communication









The College of Communication received a substantial ₱4M grant from the Commission on Higher Education – Institutional Development and Innovation Grants (CHED-IDIG) to upgrade decadesold equipment of TV and Radio Laboratories. The procurement process is underway, with anticipated delivery in the first or second quarter of 2024, thanks to the recommendation and endorsement by Dr. Joselito F. Villaruz.

Additionally, the College acquired industry-standard multimedia equipment as a grant from the Department of Agriculture Regional Office 6. This equipment is now utilized for DYWV-Radio West Visayas online streaming.










Furthermore, the close-circuit radio station has been reoperationalized, serving as a training platform for students to enhance their research, writing, and broadcasting skills. The station also disseminates news, updates, and information from various offices in the University.

The College organized a university-wide film production workshop, PAGTAHAL, in collaboration with WVSU Film Society and SineMaskom, guided by Ms. Kareen L. Gancio. This workshop imparted valuable knowledge on scriptwriting, directing, cinematography, acting, production design, and post-production.





College of Communication students actively engaged in producing research-based media materials addressing local issues, particularly in the City and Province of Iloilo.

In collaboration with the Embassy of Canada, the COC co-hosted the Marshall McLuhan Forum Series on Responsible Media, aiming to establish an annual partnership agreement. Journalist, Mr. Christian Esguerra, the McLuhan Fellow, highlighted ways to combat mis- and disinformation in all media platforms.







Two COC students, Jeanne Michaella Anthonette Nanquil and Hershey Geline Sumpay, participated in the student exchange program at Mohawk College in Canada for one semester (August-December 2023).

In the realm of research, a publication by Professors Espada, Quero, and Alingasa was featured in a referred journalism journal at Syarif Hidayatullah State Islamic University Jakarta, Indonesia.







Moreover, faculty members received recognition in research activities, with Ms. Josyl Aranas chosen as a grantee participant of Southeast Asia Regional Center for Graduate Study and Research in Agriculture (SEARCA), and Prof. Zsa Zsa M. Bacaling securing 1st Place as Best Presenter and 2nd Place Best Paper at the 1st Regional ASEAN Research Conference by CHED RO 6.

College of Dentistry



Under the mandate of the administration of former President Rodrigo Duterte, the Doctor of Dental Medicine (DMD) program was developed in response to the shortage of dentists in the Philippines especially in deprived areas. A Return Service Obligation Policy encourages students to practice in the Philippines. For three years after graduation and passing the Dentist Licensure Examination, graduates may work in academia, government agencies, research, or other sectors in the country. This initiative also aims to address the brain drain in the field of dentistry. The orientation was facilitated by Chair Dr. Janine Capaciete, Co-chair Dr. Glorie Sabando, University Legal Counsel Dr. Ryan Castro, and Dr. Liza Assumpta Jover.







Every year, the college conducts capacity building and faculty development activities to enhance teaching skills and strengthen instruction toward achieving the desired program outcomes. This workshop introduces the importance of mentoring students to increase motivation and sense of security and safety. The resource speaker was Dr. Anne Margarett Subiron.



Regarding the percentage of undergraduate programs with accreditation: The program underwent a second evaluation and monitoring, receiving a government permit for Levels III-IV. It currently has permits for Levels I-IV and intends to apply for Levels V and VI by FY 2024.

In the development and enhancement of instructional materials, a target of 37 syllabi and laboratory manuals was achieved. The table below illustrates the side-by-side crafting and validation of syllabi by the technical panel for Levels I-IV. These syllabi are currently being utilized in various courses except for Level IV.



















A 100% target of dental equipment and models was achieved. However, due to delivery delays, their classroom utilization has not been fully maximized.

The College library holdings achieved 86.96% of the 100% target for levels I-III. An average of 2-3 textbooks and references, in both physical and digital formats, are available for faculty and students. According to Section 17 of CHED #3 series 2018, institutions must provide 10 titles of international and peer-reviewed journals and periodicals. Section 11 of CHED 2006 requires institutions offering Dentistry programs to provide at least five copies of each basic textbook for all curriculum subjects and a minimum of three references with four copies each.



Dental books are expensive, and the budget for procurement is insufficient due to the low student population. With an average budget of Php500 per student, the College appreciates the top management's support in providing additional funds from the University's savings.

The College's 12 full-time and part-time faculty have actively participated in in-house capacity-building activities and dental professional conferences held by the Philippine Dental Association and other accredited professional organizations.

One significant in-house training, "Training and Orientation to Preclinical Skills Courses for Faculty and Students," was postponed to January 2024 due to the following factors: Lack of proper facility/venue, long list of requirements for student travel outside the university, and scheduling conflicts.









College of Education

Center of Excellence in Teacher Education

University graduates must be equipped with the knowledge, skills and values to make them globally competitive. Journal For Law Advocacy

The College has already published two (2) volumes of its Journal For Law Advocacy in compliance with the requirements of the Legal Education Board (LEB). The main topic of the first edition was election laws and also included student articles covering a wide array of topics and was launched last December 2022. The second edition was all about human rights and was launched December 2023.



Linkages

The COL has also formed several partnerships with various organizations, including The Asia Foundation, which has provided crucial support in training faculty and students in the legal education program and supplying the necessary resources and facilities for its implementation. These partnerships have expanded the College's network, especially in terms of prospective beneficiaries, as it develops its extension services. Additionally, the College looks forward to establishing international linkages in line with the Internationalization Agenda of WVSU.

Establishment of the Bar Operations Committee

The COL also established the Bar Operations Committee to prepare the pioneer batch for the Bar Examinations in September 2024.

Externship Programs



Batch Banaag (4th year JD Students and pioneer batch) were accredited as Law Student Practitioners (LSPs) last December 2021.

Batch Kadampig (3rd year JD Students) were accredited as Law Student Practitioners (LSPs) with Level I Certification last January 2023.

Batch Dagu-ob (2nd year JD Students) were accredited as Law Student Practitioners with Level 1 Certification last September 2023.

Under Level I Certification, LSPs are allowed to: (1) Interview prospective clients; (2) Give legal advice to the client; (3) Negotiate for and on behalf of the client; (4) Draft legal documents such as affidavits, compromise agreements, contracts, demand letter, position papers, and the like; (5) Represent eligible parties before quasi-judicial or administrative bodies; (6) Provide public legal orientation; and (7) Assist in public interest advocacies for policy formulation and implementation.

The LSPs were required to participate in an externship program with various government offices. This program provided practical work experience and enabled them to apply the principles of law learned in law school. The externship lasted for 150 hours.

Further, Ms. Mary Julienne Bongcac, a 3rd year JD student, embarked on a legal internship with the Office of the Solicitor General (OSG) in Makati City, Philippines, for seven weeks. Ms. Bongcac was among the 60 students nationwide who were selected to be part of the Legal Internship Program (LIP) of the OSG this year.


Participation to Different Conferences and Trainings

The year 2023 was once again eventful for the College of Medicine, marked by numerous achievements and challenges. Throughout it all, the college remained true to its aspirations, embodied in its Vision and Mission



Remarkable Performance in the Physician Licensure Examinations



This fiscal year, the College has continued its commendable performance in the **Physician Licensure Examinations (PLE). In the March 2023 PLE**, it obtained an overall passing rate of **75%**, way above national passing percentage of 50%. In that examination,

Dr. Carl Angelo M. Hofilena, the valedictorian of 2021, garnered the **9th place** in the Top 10 examinees. Meanwhile, during the **October 2023 PLE**, WVSU COM got an **89.81% passing rate** and was recognized as the 9th best performing school. The national passing percentage was 63.24%.

Outstanding Performance of Students in Local, Regional, and National Competitions

COM students have showcased the University's excellence through their outstanding performances in local and regional competitions. At the local level, the Order of Asclepius was recognized as the most outstanding student organization for Academic Year 2022-2023 at WVSU, with the Asian Medical Students Association as runner-up. In the regional arena, the College dominated the awards at the Association of Philippine Medical Colleges – Student Network Regional Convention in February 2023.



Successful Full Resumption of Face-to-Face Instruction and Hospital Duties






In 2022, COM was the first among the Colleges to resume limited face to face classes. Learning from the lessons derived therefrom, it went on to full-scale implementation of faceto-face classes in Roxas Hall and face-to-face duties of its clinical clerks at WVSU Medical Center. The transition was not easy and there several times recalibration of steps was necessary, but on the whole, the resumption of the usual way of doing things was successful and beneficial to all stakeholders. This decision to take the necessary risk was founded on the realization that becoming a physician requires experiential learning where didactic lectures or simulation alone inadequate.

Simulation-Based Education Program

Simulation-based education (SBE) is an important strategy in the training of physicians because it provides an error-forgiving environment where the various skills of medical practice can be mastered in a much safer and less taxing environment for both physicianstrainers and students. The College was able to acquire high-, medium- and low-fidelity mannikins and task trainers from grants from the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) as well as from its own savings. Eventually, these pieces of equipment will be housed in its own building, the CSSL building, which was built specifically for this program, with WVSU aspiring to become the center for SBE in the Visayas in the next few years. Consequently, the curriculum content of the COM medical program is being revised in order to include SBE as a requisite component. Also, faculty members and staff have undergone training in SBE both locally and abroad.

College of Nursing

Center of Development in Nursing





Once again, the student performance in the recently released Nursing Licensure Examination result made history with **100** % **passing rate** with rank 1, 8, 9, and 10 as top performing examinees. CON was recognized by the Board of Nursing as consistently the first among the top performing nursing school.

Each semester, instructional materials for both Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) and Master of Arts in Nursing (MAN) courses are updated to ensure they are current, relevant, and aligned with learning objectives, enhancing engagement among learners. These materials are meticulously produced by each division to meet the desired competencies of the learners.







The faculty-produced instructional materials were initially reviewed by the local IM committee and were scheduled to be submitted to the University IM Committee by April. However, some submissions fell short, as not all were submitted for evaluation by the local IM committee.









The College of Nursing aimed to strengthen faculty capabilities through holistic growth activities. Last year, it conducted a total of four faculty development activities. The fourth workshop, held on December 13-14, 2023, focused on 'Revisiting, Redefining, and Reevaluating Nursing Assessment Tools.' Previous workshops included topics such as 'Cultivating Inclusivity and a Culture of Excellence,' 'Enhancing Spiritual Wellness,' 'Curriculum Review, Self-Compassion, and Resilience,' and 'Simulation-Based Education (SBE) Training.

The BSN program has been recognized as a Center for Development. The CON focuses on advancing education, research, and professional growth within the nursing faculty. They initiated Simulation Based Education (SBE), with 9 core members of the SBE group trained at Adelaide University, Columbia University, and Naresuan University in Thailand. The College conducts research and has received international recognition. Both the BSN and MAN programs were accredited by AACCUP, with the BSN program awarded Level 4 Phase 2 and the MAN program awarded Level 2 Phase 1.





In 2023, the university's linkages with other institutions commenced with benchmarking visits. These included visits to Yokohama City University in Yokohama, Japan, and Naresuan University in Thailand, as well as engagements with the Find Network for Visiting Professors.

College of PESCAR

The College of Physical Education, Sports, Culture, Arts and Recreation (PESCAR) continues its steadfast commitment to delivering unparalleled services to its constituents, aligning closely with the mission, vision, and core values of the University. Through a dedicated focus on offering professional and technical instruction, the College has achieved remarkable success in providing a well-rounded educational experience encompassing physical education, sports, culture, and the arts. This dedication extends to fostering a lifelong appreciation for leisure-time activities, promoting physical fitness, and offering a diverse range of recreational and cultural programs.

This outstanding achievement significantly contributed to the overall secondary teacher education rating of the College of Education. Moreover, these programs achieve 100% passing rate from first-time takers in the September 2023 LET.

The comprehensive evaluation conducted by CHED Regional Office VI affirmed the quality of the College's undergraduate programs. All three degree programs in the college are fully compliant with the prescribed minimum requirements set by CHED.





To ensure the continued quality of its programs, the Bachelor of Culture and Arts Education program underwent rigorous evaluation, qualifying as a candidate for the first survey visit, while the Master in Music Education program achieved Level 1 accreditation, positioning it for further accreditation in subsequent surveys.

The College's commitment to academic excellence extends beyond traditional classrooms. Faculty members continue to contribute significantly to the academic landscape, with one faculty member producing supplemental instructional materials for street dance, enriching the educational experience for students.

Participation in cultural events further highlights the College's dedication to promoting cultural heritage and artistic expression. **Grupo del Oeste**'s success in the **Sinamba sa Paraw Regatta**, winning **1st Runner-up** and **Best in Music**, underscores the College's prowess in cultural competitions. Similarly, the Ironglrong Dance Company's performance showcasing the llonggo culture at the CCP Indak Pilipinas 2023 in Metro Manila reflects the College's commitment to the preservation of Filipino culture and heritage.

Faculty Awards



Online Accreditation with the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP)





Bolstered the institutional framework to become a research-university through awards in research-endeavors among faculty and students.

C/Capt John Reb Misamen, 2Cl of Bachelor of Elementary Education II-A, was recognized as the 'Cadet of the Year' during the 28th Founding Anniversary Celebration of the 5th Air Reserve Center on October 6, 2023 at Base Theater, Brigadier General Benito N. Ebuena Air Base, Lapu-Lapu, Cebu City.





Five students of the campus actively participated and confidently presented the proposed initiative named "**MOBILE ECOBINS**," moveable trash bins made up of eco bricks, which will be used to help implement proper waste segregation inside the campus and encourage solid waste management through recycling plastic waste.



A seminar-workshop on designing learning experiences for teachers was held in order to improve teachers' proficiency in creating meaningful, appropriate, and relevant learning experiences across disciplines. Classroom observation and mentoring are used to evaluate how well the knowledge and skills from the training are being applied.

Instruction Division Monthly Meetings were held to re-assess the existing practices and come-up with workable solutions on problems, issues and concerns at hand. This meeting is facilitated by the Director for Academic Affairs and being followed by meeting of teachers by school and department. To monitor the success of the meeting SATA-MAT is required.







In preparation for the opening of the first semester on July 27, 2023, teachers on campus conducted a workshop on syllabi-making and course mapping. This hybrid training workshop aimed to emphasize the importance of well-crafted course syllabi that capture the required learning competencies and skills for the 21st century.

Lambunao Campus

The Lambunao Campus of WVSU is recognized for its dedication to education, societal development, and humanitarian service. The campus focuses on enhancing academic programs in criminal justice education, teacher education, industrial technology, hospitality management, and advanced education, in line with the university's vision, mission, and objectives.



The Director of Academic Affairs prioritized the ongoing improvement of instructional materials. All degree programs saw improvements in their instructional materials, accompanied by an increase in the percentage of faculty members who developed such materials. Research and Extension outputs were integrated into the syllabus, and faculty participated in capacity-building activities to enhance technology-based instruction and blended learning.

A curriculum review was conducted for all graduate and undergraduate programs. The Bachelor of Secondary Education major in Social Studies and the Bachelor of Science in Industrial Technology major in Food Technology received the Certificate of Program Compliance (COPC) from the Commission on Higher Education (CHED).

Three programs—Doctor of Education with a concentration in Educational Management, Master of Arts in Education with a concentration in Reading, and Bachelor of Science in Industrial Technology—underwent Level III Phase 1 Accreditation submission last November. Additionally, the accreditation process for Level II was initiated for the Bachelor of Secondary Education major in Filipino. An annual ISO audit was also carried out and managed.



The administration prioritized the **Faculty Development Program**, allocating funds for seminars, workshops, conferences, and incentives for advanced studies. Faculty members were sent to both in-person and online workshops as a part of their **continuous professional development aimed at enhancing their teaching within a learning outcomes framework**.

Pototan Campus

WVSU Pototan Campus (WVSU-PC), as part of the WVSU system, has established a niche in education and training in the central part of the province. Its vision is to be a research university advancing quality education towards societal transformation and global recognition. It remains committed to its core values of excellence, creativity and innovation, and service to its stakeholders.

WVSU-PC is dedicated to cultivating outstanding graduates through effective instruction and meaningful research involvement. The institution aims to enhance research-driven curricular programs that align with regional and national development objectives. It strives to foster a cohesive community of faculty researchers and mentors.



For the number of courses with enhanced instructional materials per degree program, the target is 1 per degree program. WVSU-PC has 7 programs and achieved 10. For the number of instructional materials produced per division or department, the target is 1 per division or department, with an accomplishment of 10. For the percentage of courses utilizing blended modality over the total number of courses, the target is 10%, with an accomplishment of 100%. Regarding the percentage of faculty who produced instructional materials, the target is 40%, with an accomplishment of 12.68%.

All faculty members were trained both internally and externally in delivering blended, hybrid, and hi-flex learning setups.




External experts from different State Universities and Colleges, **Higher Education Institutions**, and **private and government agencies**, within and outside the country, were tapped as the panel of evaluators.




Number of Research Completed Within the Year



Research Activities Conducted in FY 2023























As the conduit of university-generated knowledge and technology for community development, the University Extension and Development Center (UEDC) continues to perform its function in line with its key result areas and strategic goals. As the central processing unit of extension activities in the university, UEDC is committed to maintaining an active role in the dynamic research, innovation, and extension ecosystem.

For FY 2023, UEDC continued to capacitate its faculty extensionists in areas such as research-based extension proposal writing and production of IEC materials. Extension policies approved in the past two years have also started to be implemented such as the extension load credit scheme and research-based extension project proposals. The 26th in-house review for FY 2024 project implementation was also conducted with emphasis given to research-based extension proposal writing. For faculty- extensionists to give equal attention to extension aside from instruction and research, UEDC formalized the conduct of regular extension orientation for newly hired WVSU faculty.


Highlights of Accomplishments





For PREXC-E Output Indicator 2, the University fell short of its target for 85.19% of 2023, registering the of extension programs organized and supported consistent with the SUCs mandated and priority programs (Figure 9 and 10). The unmet target is due to extension projects that have been terminated in the previous year and that there are only 48 ongoing remaining extension projects for 2023.



Strategic Accomplishments

Extension, being an integral part of the University's function continues to contribute to the strategic goals set by West Visayas State University. In 2023, the unified performance of the colleges and satellite campuses in achieving Goal 3 and sub-objectives (To develop and package high-impact research-based programs responsive to the community's needs) needs further improvement as it has not reached the targets set.

There was a Level 4 participation in all project development phases among primary stakeholders in all extension programs/projects.

















Knowledge Technology Transfer and Business Development

The Knowledge, Technology Transfer and Business Development Center (KTTBDC) is a new office created under the Office of the Vice President for Research, Innovation and Extension (VPRIE) per BOR Resolution No. 60-2023 issued last June 5, 2023. KTTBDC is focused on the implementation of IP and Technology Transfer policies, processes, and facilitates the commercialization of the university- developed technologies through its three (3) sub-units namely: Intellectual Property Office (ITSO), Knowledge Technology Transfer Office (KTTO) and the Business Incubator Nurturing Homegrown Innovations (BINHI) TBI facility. It aims to strengthen the University's innovation ecosystem in order to achieve our goal of becoming a research university.

Intellectual Property, Creation and Protection

The Intellectual Property Office is the Innovation Technology Support Office (ITSO) which is recognized by the Intellectual Property Office of the Philippines (IPOPHL). It is tasked to lead the IP creation, protection and supports technology transfer and promotion. IPO/ITSO continuously conducts IP awareness campaigns among the university community to facilitate the creation of IP. The office conducts IP audit to determine the IP potentials among the submitted and terminated researches from URDC and capacitates the researchers by conducting a 5-day Patent Search and Drafting Training Workshop in the hope of producing and filing appropriate Patents. The office also facilitated the filing of Copyrights and performed Patent Prosecution of the returned application with office actions. Last march 28, 2023, IPOPHL presented the Gold Award on the 2022 ITSO Clustering for achieving our targets.

Highlights of the Accomplishments

It also conducted Patent Search and Drafting Training, June 26, 20, 2023 at Go Hotel, Bacolod City, in partnership with the WVSU Himamaylan City Campus.



Intellectual Property, Creation, and Protection

The Knowledge & Technology Transfer Office (KTTO) is a new office created per BOR Resolution No. 60-2023 issued last June 5, 2023. The office is tasked to manage and promote intellectual property (IP) assets, facilitate technology transfer and commercialization activities and serve as a conduit between the university and industry.

The office aims to connect the IP assets of the University to the private sector and the community, and transform inventions into commercial products and services.

KTTO plans to conduct an IP audit and assessment to determine the technology readiness level of identified research and technologies. The office will also conduct capacity-building activities, seminars, and training sessions such as 'From Ideation to Impact: Creating Research with Impact' and 'From Lab to Market: Technology and Market Readiness.' Additionally, the office facilitates the application and processing of the Fairness Opinion Report (FOR) from the Fairness Opinion Board (FOB), chaired by DOST.



The West Visayas State University Land Use Development and Infrastructure Plan was approved by the Board of Regents last May 2, 2023.







As such, these campuses, including the Medical Center, will focus more on upgrading their current facilities through retrofitting or rehabilitation, and develop the infrastructures vertically.






Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses 2020-2023




Total Budget 2020-2023


Income Generation



Gross Income Per Unit





Financial Stability

The **West Visayas State University Medical Center** has bounced back from the onslaught of the pandemic. For FY 2023, the operating budget of the hospital was at ₱1,704,985,661 from the following sources:


BUDGET UTILIZATION RATES (2021-2023) FUND 101



The disbursement rate (BUR2) is at 68%, the remaining 32% are for unpaid obligations under MOOE including undelivered/incomplete delivery of supplies and materials.

For its GAA (Fund 101), the obligation rate (BUR 1) is at 68%, the remaining 32% is because of delivery extensions requested by some suppliers due to non-availability of stocks and the MOA for the ₱500M with DPWH is on process.

BUDGET UTILIZATION RATES (2021-2023) FUND 164




The disbursement rate (BUR2) is at 67%, the remaining (33%) are for unpaid obligations like supplies, materials and equipment awaiting delivery.

For its hospital income (Fund 164), the obligation rate (BUR 1) is at 50%. The procurement process is still ongoing both for MOOE & CO and there are delays in the processing of CO projects due to late approval of UMC RAUC amounting 200M.

Report of Income

The total income is at ₱214M while the target income is ₱232,848,000. The 38-40% of total income came from PHIC collections and the top 3 units contributing to this are the Pharmacy (~₱38.2M), accommodation (~₱32.1M), and the DID (~₱27.8M).





The low Bed Occupancy Rate in FY 2023 is a result of the uncontrollable factors still brought about by the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic and other contributing factors: (1) Low inpatient admissions in areas dedicated to COVID and other infectious diseases, (2) Low admissions and occupancy rates in the specialty areas, (3) Delay in inpatient admissions, and (4) Longer than usual turnaround time in cleaning or disinfecting the rooms or beds due to the strict implementation of infection control policies and guidelines.

University Health Services

The accomplishments of the medical and dental clinic for the past 3 years are shown below. The number of medical and dental consultations have increased however the number of personnel undergoing the annual medical check-up is still low.

Leading the Advancement of Knowledge in Agriculture and Sciences (LAKAS) program


The SBE program will enhance and upgrade the quality of education in the medical and health sciences in order to produce highly competent health care professionals that will manage the health care system. The main goal of the program is to improve safety within patient care. Together with this program is the establishment of a Medical & Health Sciences Clinical Skills Simulation Laboratory in the main campus.

This facility will have simulation activities which may include some or all of the following: use of life-like manikins with varying levels of complexity (human patient simulation), virtual reality computerized animations, specialized trainers for repeated practice of medical interventions (task trainers), and actors (standardized patients) trained to behave and respond as patients. This will be the first in the region and will be designed to accommodate interprofessional practices.

All educational methodologies will be designed to instruct future doctors, nurses, dentists and other healthcare practitioners through a process of immersive learning in which the learners respond to various patient conditions and then reflect upon their own responses making changes as needed. It will offer a learning environment for students to attain academic success and cultural growth, to build and expand their knowledge and skills, and to develop both as individuals and as citizens that transform communities.

The Phase 2 of the Increased Carrying Capacity of the COM with a budget of ₱46.981,000 (MOOE and CO) covers for the structural completion of the 5-storey building that will house the SGD rooms and computer laboratory. These projects are in preparation for the implementation of the ACCELERATED PATHWAY FOR MD (APMed) PROGRAM: A Pilot Implementation for Development of SMART Future Ready Physicians in West Visayas State University.





Supplies And Materials

The Increase in Carrying Capacity of Nursing and Allied Health project with a budget of \$\mathbb{P}48,590,000\$ involved hiring of additional faculty members and laboratory technicians for both the College of Nursing and College of Dentistry. A radiologic technician was also hired for the College of Dentistry. In addition, manikin and equipment for the enhancement of the RLEs of the students in the College of Nursing's were also purchased.





The Phase II of the College of Dentistry Building with a budget of ₱25,000,000 has provided enclosure and other structural needs.



The WVSUMC Genome Laboratory and Acquisition of Laboratory Equipment amounting to ₱20,000,000.00 will enhance the processes and capacity of the Molecular Diagnostic Laboratory. It will aid in the effort to increase the bio-surveillance capacity to detect the novel variants of viruses and will be used in other clinical researches and trials in the field of human genetics, infectious disease and molecular oncology.

The Capacity Building on University Research Futures Thinking and Foresight for West Visayas State University capstone project entitled "Mental Wellness for Resilient Filipino in Western Visayas" completed the 3-phase activities with consultants from Aptissimi Development Innovations Inc. The 60 faculty participants of WVSU were able to present 4 research proposals on Peer Support, Mental Health Education & Awareness, Workplace Mental Health Initiatives, and Mental Health Screening Tools. These researches once approved will be implemented in 2024.

Result of Operations

The University's revenue generation and financial management for FY 2023 shows a net surplus of P275 million, which decreased by 30% compared to FY 2022, as shown in Tables 1, 2, and 3.

Subsidy and Revenue Performance

The University's gross revenue from academic operation and hospital services in FY 2023 amounted to over ₱1 billion, a slight decrease from the revenue for FY 2022. Revenue from academic operations decreased by 42% while hospital services increased by 21%. The government subsidy for hospital services increased by 7% and academic operations by 4%.

On the other hand, expenses increased by 4% and 12% for hospital services and academic operations respectively. The revenue of academic and hospital services, coupled with an increase in expenses, resulted in a total decrease of 30% for FY 2023.

It should be noted that the gross revenue and expenses recorded include the operations of the New Born Screening Center Visayas (NSCV) and the Income Generating Projects (IGP) of the University.

As a state-owned university, WVSU continues to receive subsidy from the National Government by virtue of General Appropriations Act of 2023, otherwise known as RA 11936, recorded as government subsidy (Fund 101). Tuition and other school fees for higher education are also being provided by the government after the implementation of Free Higher Education under RA 10931. The collection of hospital fees along with government subsidy financed the operations of the University Medical Center.




FIGURE 1. BREAKDOWN OF REVENUE (All Funds)

Moreover, analysis of the various sources of income in Figure 1 shows that the subsidy from the National Government with a total amount of ₱1.827 billion accounted 64% of the total cash receipts. The business income from academic operations amounted to ₱241 million. Additionally, the income from hospital services amounted to ₱769 millions. The total service and business income for FY 2023 was ₱994 million or 36% of total gross receipts of the University. Grants and donations of ₱16 million was at 1% of total gross receipts. Least among the rest, gains of ₱115 thousand also contributed .004%.




FIGURE 2. REVENUE PER CAMPUS (All Funds)

Slicing up the income contribution of the various operating units of the University in generating revenue from internal sources, the Medical Center generated 76% of the total income followed by the Main campus at 17% (Figure 2).




Figure 3. PERCENTAGE OF REVENUE TYPE PER FUND

Considering the percentage of income from two major fund sources of the University (Figure 3), it is evident that both academic operations and hospital services are highly dependent from government subsidy (General Appropriations Fund). As showed in Figure 3, 77% of the operations of the Main Campus is funded from the government subsidy (Fund 101) and 52% for the Medical Center. On the other hand, the satellite campuses namely, College of Agriculture and Forestry, Calinog, Himamaylan City, Janiuay, Lambunao, and Pototan, 67-89% were funded from government subsidy while 11-33% of their operations were sourced from internally generated income.

Expenditures

In carrying out its tri-fold mandated functions – instruction, research, and extension, the University utilized resources in line with the organization's outcomes as well as the University's strategic plans. For FY 2023, the total expenses of the University increased by 7%, or from ₱2.4 billion in FY 2022 to ₱2.5 billion in FY 2023.




Figure 4. BREAKDOWN OF EXPENSES (ALL FUNDS)

Taking into consideration the distribution of the total expenses of the University per expenditure type, Figure 4 shows that the Personal Services amounted to 62%, Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses amounted to 32%, and noncash expenses amounted to 6% of the total expenses.

Figure 5. EXPENSES PER CAMPUS (ALL FUNDS)




Figure 6. EXPENSES PER CAMPUS (ALL FUNDS)

The analysis of expenses per unit reveals that the larger part of the expenses was incurred by the University Medical Center and the Main Campus at 50% and 28%, respectively. The external campuses incurred 2% – 5% of the total University expenses (Figure 5).

Looking over the percentages of expenses funded by the government subsidy and internally generated funds (excluding Fund 184), Figure 6 indicates that most of expenses of the University were funded by the government subsidy. As shown in Figure 6, 64%-84% were funded by the government subsidy while 16%-37% were charged against off-budgetary funds.

Personnel services that comprised more than 62% of government expenses were mostly funded by the government subsidy, while MOOE and Capital Outlay projects were mostly funded by internally generated income.

Financial Position

With regards to the status of funds of the University, its financial position at the end of the fiscal year is reflected on its Statement of Financial Position as of December 31, 2023. It contains all the assets and liabilities of the University including its accumulated surplus. Table 4 presents a comparative data of the financial position of the University for 2023 and 2022.

In 2023, the total assets of the University increased by 0.2%. The slight decrease in assets is mainly attributed to a decline in cash balance and inventories at the end of the year. On the other hand, the total liabilities increased by 2%. The accumulated surplus shows a negligible decrease of 0.1%. The current liabilities of the University include accounts payable to external and internal creditors, and grants from other government agencies for scholarships and special projects subject to liquidation.

Moreover, investments in property, plant, and equipment resulted in an increase in capital assets by ₱94 million or 5% in 2023. Constructing buildings in the University and purchasing various equipment resulted in a percentage increase of capital assets by 21% and 11% respectively. Land donated by the City Government of Himamaylan to the Himamaylan City Campus contributed to a 3% increase in capital assets. Table 5 reflects the major increase in property, plant, and equipment of the University in 2023.

Cash Sources and Utilization

Considering the University's liquidity, the cash balance at the end of the year decreased by \$\mathbb{P}\$122 million or 8% in 2023. This was due to an increase in cash outflows as payment for the operating activities of the University. Balances in cash from government subsidy is automatically returned to the National Treasury at the end of the year. The Statement of Cash Flows in Table 6 provides a view of the sources and uses of the University's cash resources.

As presented in Table 6, the cash provided by operating activities decreased by 105% in 2023. The collection of income from both academic and hospital operations and collection of trust receipts or funds received for the implementation of special projects and scholarship grants comprised the cash inflows from operating activities. An increase of 1% can be seen in 2023, but the corresponding outflows for payment of Personal Services and Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses, payables incurred in operations, trust payments, and remittances due to other government agencies also increased by 10% in 2023. Lastly, the cash used to purchase of property, plant, and equipment decreased by 7% or \$7.3 million.

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
